Prospective vocational education and training students should view themselves as consumers of training services ... in other words ... customers. Like any other significant purchase, you should do your research. The Queensland Government has a website that offers tips for training consumers which include:

- Checking that the course you want to do meets your needs
- Ensure that the course is nationally recognised and leads to a formal qualification (recognised by the Australian Qualifications framework)
- Check your eligibility for government subsidised training
- Shop around for a training provider that best suits your needs
- Confirm your preferred training provider is a registered training provider
- Be cautious about paying large sums of money up-front
- Read the contract before signing

School holiday career exploration

An important strategy in career exploration is experiencing the job you are interested in. This can be undertaken in many ways:

- Work observation spending a day or more with someone already in the job at their workplace
- Career interview developing a list of questions and interviewing someone already in a job you are investigating
- Work experience spending some time (a week if possible) in the job
- Investigating courses by visiting institutions and talking to providers about their courses
- Getting a part-time job or volunteering in your job of interest
- Doing a course or workshop that relates to the type of work you want to do.

The school holidays are a perfect time to do some of these activities. If you need help organising an activity, speak to your school Guidance Counsellor/Officer or work experience coordinator.

Six Traits that Predict High Performance in Life

Growing Learners, Tim Elmore, suggests that we often assume that your "report card" will be an indicator of what life will look like as you transition from school to tertiary/training and then onto work. Grades are not always a predictor of career success. The cliché that the straight "A" students will likely be working for a "C" student comes to mind.

Psychologists Ian MacRae and Adrian Furnham have now <u>identified</u> six traits that are consistently linked to workplace success. They are:

1. Conscientiousness

Conscientiousness naturally motivates people to follow through on tasks and projects. Conscientious people are good at conquering their impulses; they can delay gratification. After IQ, conscientiousness is often <u>considered</u> one of the best predictors of life outcomes. At work, high conscientiousness is essential for good strategic planning.

2. Adjustment

Everyone faces anxiety at some time, but when you can adapt to the stress and continue without falling apart you will be better off. When you get anxious you can try reframing a stressful situation into a potential source of personal growth or awareness ... turn your "mess" into a "message" (always seek help if you are unable to manage your anxiety and stress).

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3. Ambiguity Acceptance

Ambiguity acceptance is about your ability to face diversity, chaos and uncertainty—and still keep moving forward. It's a cousin to adaptability but it is more about your understanding —can you digest many perspectives, understanding the complexities of your reality and find solutions? People with a high tolerance for ambiguity <u>can</u> incorporate many more viewpoints before coming to a decision. This is vital today.

4. Curiosity

We often talk about "lifelong learners." Lifelong learning is a key to thriving. BBC Journalist David Robson <u>writes</u>, "Recent research shows that an inherent interest in new ideas brings many advantages to the workplace. It may mean that you are more creative and flexible in the procedures you use, help you to learn more easily, increases your overall job satisfaction and protects you from burnout." Curious people are happier and they see new days as opportunities.

5. Risk Approach

Risk approach is about how courageous we are when faced with risky situations. People with a high risk approach face unpleasant situations now, knowing they usually lead to clarity and better outcomes later. Not surprisingly, the capacity to deal with difficult situations is critical for management positions where you need to take action for the greater good, even in opposition.

6. Competitiveness

Competitiveness can be a mixed bag. At its best, competitiveness can lead to pushing yourself to get better, to learn from your competition and to do the hard yards; at its worst, it can tear people apart. It can prevent you from getting complacent and satisfied with the current performance but don't let competitiveness drive you – keep it in perspective.

If you have experienced difficult circumstances during you schooling and wish to study the Bachelor of Laws (Honours) at UQ, you are invited to apply for:

- TC Beirne School of Law Leadership, Excellence and Diversity (LEAD) Scholarship and/or
- UQ Special Admissions Scheme (SAS) for undergraduate law programs.

The LEAD Scholarship provides \$7000 per year for up to five years to help with living and study expenses; a dedicated academic mentor; a support network through non-residential membership of a UQ college and

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priority access to internships and career planning assistance. Applications for the LEAD Scholarship will open online on the <u>TC Beirne School of Law website</u> shortly so keep checking the site for 2019 details.

Note that when applying for courses through QTAC, you need to identify as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander on the application. You may have to provide the university with a Confirmation of Aboriginality. To obtain this might take time, so organise it early.

Did you know? The following facts and figures were sourced from recent NCVER research and data:

- There were 83 500 Indigenous students enrolled in the government-funded VET system in 2016 an increase of 12.5% from the previous year: <u>Government-funded students and courses 2016</u>
- Indigenous graduates report high levels of satisfaction with VET and personal benefits from undertaking training, regardless of whether they are employed after training or not: <u>Indigenous VET</u> participation, completion and outcomes: change over the past decade

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- Indigenous people continue to participate in VET at higher rates than the non-Indigenous population across all age groups and sexes, and have done so for the past decade: <u>Indigenous VET</u> participation, completion and employment outcomes: infographic
- Supportive families and communities can contribute to higher retention and completion rates for Indigenous VET students, and trainers and providers can play an active role in encouraging this family and community support: <u>VET retention in remote Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander</u> <u>communities: good practice guide</u>

Looking at a diplomatic or international development career?

The Conversation published a speech by Gareth Evans, Chancellor of the Australian National University on this topic. Evens, who has had extensive experience in these jobs, noted that to get a diplomatic or international development job you need skills, experience and luck. The following is a summary of the required skills he mentioned in the speech.

- Good results in a challenging university degree, or combination of degrees (the discipline doesn't really matter). Employers are looking for a strong underlying intellectual capacity and the ability to apply this to new situations.
- It's important to be able to demonstrate an interest and knowledge of international relations. The way you acquire the knowledge is to read (e.g. The Economist, The Conversation).
- At least one foreign language, or a demonstrated aptitude to learn quickly, is a prerequisite for any significant international relations job these days.
- Few skills matter more for a would-be diplomat than the ability to write well and, above all, accurately. Good oral communication and advocacy skills are also extremely helpful in foreign policy related jobs.
- Good social skills.
- The capacity to get things done. To have a good sense of process and the ability to get people working together to deliver outcomes.

What's the difference between a Registered Nurse and an Enrolled Nurse?

Registered nurses (RN) assess, plan, provide and evaluate preventative, curative and rehabilitative care for patients and supervise other nursing staff. They work in a wide variety of settings such as hospitals, aged care and other health care facilities and private medical practices. They need:

- good communication skills,
- the ability to assume responsibility and a leadership roles

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- tolerance, patience and tact in dealing with people from a wide range of backgrounds and cultures
- to take the initiative in emergencies
- an ability to work both independently and as part of a team
- the ability to cope with the physical demands and psychological aspects of the job.

To become a RN, you need to complete a three-year Bachelor of Nursing at a university or other accredited institute of higher education. RNs are required to be registered with the <u>Nursing and Midwifery Board of</u> <u>Australia</u>. You can obtain more information about this occupation from the <u>myfuture website</u> (you will need to Log in or Sign up to enter this free site) and the <u>Good Universities Guide website</u> (this site has a list of nursing specialisations).

Enrolled Nurses (EN) under the direction and supervision of Registered Nurses, assist with the provision of acute, preventative, curative, rehabilitative and the day-to-day personal nursing care of patients. They work in hospitals, aged-care facilities, the community and other healthcare settings. ENs need to:

- have good communication, problem-solving and team skills
- follow instructions precisely
- be tolerant, patient and tactful with many different types of people.

To become an EN in Australia, the minimum level of study is the Diploma of Nursing (18 months – 2 years), delivered through TAFE or an accredited private Registered Training Organisation. After graduation, ENs apply for registration with the <u>Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia</u> to practice as an Enrolled nurse. 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Applying for courses through UAC in NSW

You apply to the Universities Admissions Centre (UAC) for most courses at NSW tertiary institutions. You apply online on the <u>UAC website</u>. Note that the information for entry in 2019 is not yet on this website. Some important points about the 2018/19 UAC application are:

- Applications open on 1 August 2018
- Applicants can list five course preferences on the application
- UAC has indicated that if QLD students have results available in time they may receive an offer before Christmas. Consequently, it is important that you are aware of the UAC offer round dates.
- There will be no major offer round. All preferences will be considered in all offer rounds.

Some newsagents in Queensland are already selling the UAC Guide 2018-19.

English subject prerequisite

The most common prerequisite for entry into Queensland universities is English (Units 3 & 4, C). This means a student must study a General English subject and achieve a grade of C or higher in Units 3 & 4 (Year 12 studies). Almost all institutions requiring an English prerequisite will accept any of the four general English subjects which are:

- English
- English as an Additional Language
- Literature
- English & Literature Extension.

For prerequisite information and specific institutions prerequisite information go to the <u>QTAC website</u> (scroll down the page).

General science subject prerequisite for Bachelor of Education

University education courses now list the science prerequisite as *General science subject*. General science subjects that will meet this prerequisite for all Queensland institutions are: Agricultural Science, Biology, Chemistry, Earth & Environmental Science, Marine Science, Physics and Psychology.

Further changes have been made to the additional entry requirements for competitiveness for a place in an Education degree. QTAC are developing an online assessment tool for perspective Year 12 students looking to undertake an Degree in Education. More information to come when QTAC finalise their process.

Term three - an important time for Year 12 students

Term three is a very important and busy time of the year for Year 12 students. If you haven't already decided what you are going to do in 2019, this is the time to access information about the options available. The following is a selection of events and activities that will be held in term three to assist you with your decision-making.

QTAC Guide – If you haven't received this book yet, you will receive it shortly. It is produced by QTAC and contains information about the application process and the courses you can apply for. Don't lose this book. You may need it after you leave school on 16 November to change course preferences on your QTAC application when Year 12 results are released and during QTAC offer rounds.

Tertiary Studies Expo (TSXPO) – It will be held from 10 am – 4 pm on Saturday 21 and Sunday 22 July 2018 at Royal ICC, RNA Showgrounds, Brisbane. See the <u>website</u> for information about participating institutions, seminar presentation details and competitions.

Regional career expos – Expos on the Sunshine Coast and in Townsville will occur in July and August. They provide a great opportunity to explore employment opportunities and further education and training options. See dates on the <u>QTAC website</u>.

Institution open days - Most of the university open days occur in Term three. Open days provide an opportunity to learn more about the institutions and courses in which you are interested. Make the most of open days by developing a list of questions to ask at the event. See open day dates on the <u>QTAC website</u>.

QTAC applications open - QTAC applications for Semester one 2019 courses open on 2 August 2018. Early closing dates for some courses and some scholarship applications close on 28 September 2018. Information about the application and offer processes will be in the *QTAC Guide* and on the <u>QTAC website</u>.

Scholarships - Most university scholarship applications open in Term three and close in October, November or December. An exception is Bond University, which has its scholarship opening on 1 June 2018 each scholarship can have a different closing date. It is best to check the closing date on the <u>Bond website</u> under each scholarship entry. Every university has a section on its website about scholarships. Find out the application process and due date early to avoid missing out on a scholarship. If in doubt about your chances, apply anyway.

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Exam stress and top tips to de-stress

The following tips are adapted from the University of Queensland's Health Hub.

With exam time upon us, we can no longer avoid the worry of looming deadlines and challenging expectations (our own and other's). Everybody deals with stress differently so it is important to recognise your own signs and take control before they control you. The following behaviours can be signs of stress.

- Irregular sleep patterns
- Short temper and irritability
- That gut feeling (butterflies)
- Finding it difficult to relax or unwind
- Overreacting to situations
- Comfort food snacking or loss of appetite

If you are experiencing one, many, or all of these signs, you need to do something about it to help you handle the demands you face. The following tips could help.

Set the tone for your day - Take a few moments at the start of your day to set some good intentions and to collect your thoughts. It may sound like a no-brainer but it will give you a moment to pause before jumping into your busy day.

Create a schedule – Make a schedule or timetable for your day. For example, 8 – 8: 30 am could be for wake-up routine (shower, breakfast, etc.); 8:30 - 9:30 am could be for study; 9:30 - 9:45 am could be for a short walk or break. Creating a schedule and allocating periods to study will help increase the chances of using your time effectively.

Divide your day up – Divvy your day into manageable study blocks (try 40 - 50 minute blocks to begin with and slowly build) and stick to them. Set yourself goals on what you want to complete in that time, then have a break well away from your desk.

Take a break (maybe even eat a Kit Kat!) – Sitting down to study 24/7 in the lead up to exams will wreck you long before D-day. It may be chilly outside but there are huge benefits to getting a breath of fresh air to break up your study time. It will do wonders for your motivation and creativity.

Turn your phone off in study period – Mobile phones are an unhelpful distraction, so during your allocated study time, turn it off so you can focus on your work. The distraction of the phone can cause further stress.

Eat for your brain – Eat nutritious, little and often to avoid food comas. Go for quality food like vegetables, fruit, nuts and wholemeal bread to stimulate your brain and set yourself up for success.

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Use your nerves, don't let them use you – It may not feel like it at the time, however positive nerves can be a good thing. They help you to work and think faster while being more effective with your time and overall performance.

Shake it off – Sometimes when you feel like your head is about to explode all you need to do is let off some steam. Do whatever will make you feel at ease, whether that's a workout at the gym, making a nutritious meal, listening to some music, sitting in the sun. Whatever it takes, give yourself the time to shake the negativity and get back on task.

Warn your loved ones – Let your family and friends know what is going on as we often take our stress out on those that are the closest to us. This is the time when you need to be surrounded by support, not thinking about trivial disagreements.

Prioritise your study – It may sometimes feel that everyone wants a piece of your time (school, work, coach, friends, family) but where you can, try to explain your situation so you can put your study first and make plans for your other commitments after exams are over.

There's no such thing as procrastination

According to Dr Eric Thomas, there is no such thing as procrastination. He says that if you are putting off doing something (e.g. preparing for an exam, doing an assignment), it is because it isn't a priority for you. Therefore, you must find out how to make it meaningful enough for it to become a priority. Eric is known as ET 'the Hip Hop Preacher'. He is an author, motivational speaker, educator and pastor. Listen to ET's short Facebook video on why there is no such thing as procrastination.

UQ - Review of MD Entry Requirements

There will be no changes for 2019 admission (for provisional or graduate) however there will be changes for the 2021 entry requirements. These changes include:

• for 2021 entry, applicants will need to participate in Multi-Mini Interviews (MMIs) as well as applying to QTAC and meeting any other prerequisite

• During an applicant's undergraduate degree, they must successfully complete the tertiary subject prerequisites of Integrative Cell & Tissue Biology and System Physiology through UQ or equiliviant subjects from other university undergraduate degrees.

• Provisional students offered in 2019 need to complete required bachelor level courses in their first degree (must be met by 2022 commencement in the MD program)

What is NOT changing?

- All provisional students still need to undertake the UMAT
- All provisional students must achieve an OP 1/ATAR 99
- All provisional students must complete their designated key degree in the minimum time
- All provisional students must still achieve a GPA of at least 5.00 by the end of their key degree

UQ - Changes to assessing VET Qualifications

There will be no changes for 2018 and 2019 Seniors with regards to QTAC applying a rank to their completed VET qualifications for competitiveness into Tertiary courses after school. Changes come into effect with the introduction of the QLD ATAR (2020)

From 2020 onward

• A completed VET award may be used in the calculation of a student's ATAR where this is one of the student's best eligible study results.

• From 2020 onwards, UQ will no longer allow school-leaver applicants to receive a standalone selection rank based on a VET award alone (Certificates or Diplomas)

• ATAR applicants will still be able to use their VET qualifications to apply for entry to UQ in subsequent years (this change will not impact students completing their OPs in 2018 or 2019).

Music/Speech/Drama awards (such as AMEB awards) will not be used to derive standalone ranks for school-leavers from 2020 onwards.

- Chemistry

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UQ – Veterinary Science (Honours) and changes to entry requirements for 2019

Effective from 2019 the Bachelor of Veterinary Science will have the following additional entry requirements and subject prerequisites:

- English
- Chemistry
- Maths B
- One of Physics or Biology
- Situational Judgement Test (SJT) (to test non-academic capabilities)

What is the Situational Judgement Test? This is an online test - also referred to as CASPer - designed to test the non-academic capabilities of applicants to assess their suitability for Veterinary Science. The test is:

- Administered by <u>Altus Assessments</u>
- Costs approximately \$80AUD
- Takes approximately 90 minutes to complete
- There will be two test dates, most likely in September and October 2018 with different test papers for each sitting
- Comprised of twelve scenarios a combination of video and written scenarios. Applicants will read/watch a scenario then respond to three questions about the scenario.
- There is five minutes allocated for each response period

Recommendations

- Complete the exam in a quiet space where you can avoid being distracted
- Recommended to undertake the exam at home and not in a public space (e.g., library)
- Complete the pre-exam 'Internet Preparedness' steps to ensure your internet connection is strong
- Brush up on your typing skills!
- Read through the FAQs on the CASPer website
- Watch the example scenarios on the CASPer website

What happens with the results?

- These are given directly to the institution (applicants will not receive their results directly)
- UQ will use the results to determine if minimum non-academic requirements have been met
- Admissions will update the individual QTAC applications to reflect whether the requirements are met

What's on at ACU (Australian Catholic University)?

Student who complete Year 12 and complete a Certificate III qualification at school will be assigned two selection ranks by QTAC for ACU course preferences: their ATAR and their Certificate III derived rank. Applicants will be considered on their highest selection rank for entry into ACU. Some exceptions may apply to courses with additional entry requirements. It should be noted that Certificate III qualifications are not accepted for ranking in any other circumstance ie non-school leavers.

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
