CAR PARKING

Though it may not seem so during the rush of drop-off and pickup, but we are incredibly blessed with the number of car parking places and areas to collect our children.

Safety is paramount for us and is the responsibility of the whole community. The top car park, adjacent to the Music Centre and YMCA is a staff, visitors and people with disabilities car park. There is an increasing number of parents using it as a drop-off and pick-up zone, even though it is clearly sign posted and marked otherwise.

We have witnessed a number of near misses with children running across the car park to get into their parents' waiting vehicle. There is also increased congestion in this area caused by parents using the end of the top car park as a drop-off zone, even though it is sign posted as a "no stopping" zone. This is creating a dangerous situation.

I appreciate that lives are busy, but the safety of our children is more important than convenience. Could I ask you to support the School by using the designated car parking and drop off zones, and not use the top car park. You can drop-off or pick-up at the roundabout behind the Tooth Admin Building, the lower car park, or the Attunga Street car park, an extensive drop-off and pick-up zone.

TEEN SLEEP HABITS

Dr Seton is a Paediatric and Adolescent Sleep Physician who works at Westmead Children's Hospital. Dr Seton's special interests include Adolescent Sleep Deprivation and the relationship between sleep and learning in children.

I sat in on a webinar last week, in which Dr Seton provided some quite alarming information about adolescent sleep, or the lack thereof.

The latest science suggests that 12-18 year-olds require 9 hours sleep per night. Dr Seton acknowledged that it is a very hard sell,

trying to tell your 16 year-old that they need to go to bed at the same time as their 12 year-old little sister, but there you are.

Research suggests that 70% of Australian teens are sleep-deprived. Are you wondering about your teens? Signs that they are sleep-deprived include needing to have long sleep-ins on the weekend (in an effort to catch up on their sleep debt) and being extremely hard to get out of bed in the morning.

You won't be surprised to hear that the following are thought to contribute to this epidemic of sleep-deprivation –

- 1. Social connectedness via electronic devices, and the "fear of missing out" if they aren't on their devices late into the evening.
- 2. Body clocks that operate differently (later) in adolescence may mean that some teens struggle to get to sleep at night.
- 3. A combination of ambition, stress and over-scheduling can result in high levels of adrenalin and cortisol in the blood-stream, which works against getting to sleep.

The rate of sleep-deprivation in teenagers is thought to have doubled in the last 15 years. Is it just a coincidence that similar increases have also been seen in the incidence of mental health problems in adolescents? What is certain is that adequate sleep, good nutrition and plenty of exercise are essential for both physical and mental health and wellbeing.

So what can parents do? Dr Seton suggested that parents have a straight conversation with their kids, and negotiate some sleep-promoting rules, such as –

- 1. Homework & study must be efficient no use of mobile devices during this time as they are too distracting.
- 2. Agree on a time (and a time-limit) for accessing social media and playing online games.
- 3. Bed is for sleeping only. No mobile devices in the bedroom.
- 4. Bed-time means lights out and a mobile device curfew.
- 5. In fact, screens should be shut down one hour before you intend trying to get to sleep.
