OVERSEAS MARKETING TRIP – VISITING SISTER SCHOOLS & TRADE DELEGATION

For the last two weeks I have been visiting our Sister Schools in Japan and meeting with parents of our current International School students in Hong Kong. In addition to this, I joined a Queensland Trade Delegation promoting Queensland education, both schooling and tertiary, in Hong Kong and Macau.

At the Trade Delegation, I shared the work we are doing to support the development of key 21st Century Skills with our <u>Realms of Thinking</u> and the work we have done to develop a third pathway for learning: an entrepreneurial pathway. This work

garnered significant interest both from international educators as well as other schools from around Australia. In fact, some of these Australian schools are so impressed with the work being undertaken at St Paul's that they have booked visits to come and see firsthand what is happening on our campus. High praise indeed.

What was certainly evident, was the high regard in which the Australian education system is held by the families in each of those countries, and their keen interest in the key skills that students need to have to be successful in the world of tomorrow.

As you would expect, each of those countries is very business-oriented with the most sought-after tertiary pathway being Business Studies. The people of those countries recognise that opportunities in the future will be found in young people's ability to think like an innovator.

But I was surprised to hear parents had a particular interest in a young person's character development. Traditionally, we think of Asian cultures as being driven for academic success, but they too recognise that happiness, or fulfilment in life, isn't found in material things or a successful career, but that relationships and character matter above all else.

Each of the schools that formed part of the Trade Delegation were able to share their particular emphasis on the development of the whole person. Perhaps this is to be expected, as all of the eight schools represented were "independent schools"; and independent schools traditionally have a strong focus on a holistic education.

As always, it is interesting visiting other schools across the world to see what they are doing. There is so much to learn from each other. However, what I am constantly reminded of when I visit schools across the world is how fortunate we are in Australia. We often lament about our lot in life, but we really are extraordinarily lucky, and our children have remarkable opportunities.

STUDENT WELLBEING

At St Paul's School we subscribe to a holistic ideal of education, in which we focus on who the child is becoming, rather than simply what knowledge and skills they have acquired. We want our children to live good lives. We want them to flourish, and we believe that flourishing should be seen in all aspects of a person's life – psychological, social, emotional, intellectual, physical and spiritual.

Consequently, we are developing a bespoke Student Wellbeing Program, as an expression of our School purpose statement ("To prepare resilient global citizens, who are innovative thinkers, with

a heart for servant leadership"). Called 'Ways of Being', our wellbeing program has five key components:

- 1. Character and virtues
- 2. Values and ethics
- 3. Physical health and wellbeing
- 4. Mental health and wellbeing
- 5. Spiritual formation

You have heard me speak about character and virtues before. The St Paul's Character Framework comprises ten virtues which all members of the community are encouraged to demonstrate. These virtues are reflected in the Behavioural Choices and Consequences, which are also implemented across the school. Clear connections are made between the virtues and behaviour: where necessary, classroom teachers reinforce these connections as part of their teaching.

From the 'Ways of Being' components outlined above, we are in the process of developing a Wellbeing curriculum. This curriculum comprises a wide variety of understandings and capabilities – some of which are already embedded in the 'regular' curriculum in years P-10 as part of the Australian Curriculum (eg. Personal and Social Capability, Ethical Understanding, Intercultural Understanding), but others of which

need to be delivered in an 'add-on' manner. Of course, as a Christian school, we have chosen to include Religion and Values Education (RaVE) as part of our core teaching program, and this provides a context in P-12 to deliver some aspects of our 'Ways of Being'.

In the secondary school we have two other opportunities to engage students with 'Ways of Being'. The first of these is our vertical tutor group time where, among other things, tutors can discuss with their tutees on a regular basis issues that pertain to wellbeing. Student diaries contain special resources from The Resilience Project, which serve to stimulate thought and discussion.

We also have what are known as 'Flex' lessons, on Monday (period 6) every week. Currently these lessons are arranged in year groups, with students coming together every second week for a presentation on a topic that comes from our Wellbeing curriculum that may not be covered in sufficient depth during the course of regular lessons. The advantage of these Flex lessons (over tutor group and whole-House meetings) is that we can deliver content that is age-appropriate. We plan to address a range of sensitive topics (including sexuality and intimate relationships, mental health, drugs and alcohol, and safe use of technology) with students, revisiting topics each year in a way that is appropriate to students' stage of development. WOMEN'S WEEK 'LEADHERS' WORKSHOP


In partnership with the University of Queensland, the Centre for Innovators and Entrepreneurs held their first ever Women's Week LeadHers Workshop!

SERVICE LEARNING UPDATE - CLEAN UP AUSTRALIA DAY

Service Learning at St Paul's focuses on two specific areas: Social Justice and Environmental Stewardship. The 2019 Service Learning Environmental program got underway on Friday the 1 March with our Clean Up St Paul's Day, and was followed by Clean Up Australia Day on Sunday 3 March. This program has run for the past two years and it has been very pleasing to see steady growth in terms of student participation and the willingness of a broad range of students. Their involvement is extremely valuable to this community project!

Both events saw student participation grow by over 50% since last year. On Friday we had 57 students out and about the grounds collecting 15 bags of rubbish. The event at Pine Rivers Park on Sunday morning saw 37 intrepid representatives of the school brave a fairly wet start to the day to collect over 20 bags of rubbish from the parklands that adjoin the School. Pine Rivers Park is a central hub for our local community, hosting major events and being a meeting place for families and community organizations. Our students playing a role in keeping it clean and free of unsightly litter, is an important way for St Paul's to show our community spirit and look after our local environment.

Pleasingly, this year our anti-litter contingent was made up of representatives from all sectors of our community: family groups, past students, International students and students from across all year levels of the Secondary School. Taja House was once again well represented as this event is traditionally this House's Service project.

This year our Service Team will once again be promoting the sale of re-usable coffee cups through the Retail Shop to fund the Koala Corridor which is taking shape at the northern end of the School grounds. The Koala Corridor will continue to grow as each term students will be involved in tree-planting days. Currently we have approximately 300 trees in the ground and the team will look to bring this up to over 1000 by the end of the year. Cutting the School's waste and increasing our recycling are also projects that the Service Team are planning currently.

It is looking like a busy and highly productive year ahead.

APEX LEGENDS – WHAT PARENTS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THIS NEW ONLINE GAME

Depending on whom you ask, the word "Fortnite" evokes vastly different reactions in Australian homes. For teenagers, Fortnite is the most popular computer game of their time. For parents, Fortnite can be seen to be addictive for their children, changing their behavior and creating tensions in the household. Well, get ready for a new Fortnite.



Apex Legends arrived a few weeks ago, generating more than 25 million downloads in its first week. In contrast, Fortnite had 10 million downloads in its first fortnight in 2017. Like Fortnite, Apex Legends is part of the battle royale genre of games.

For insights into Apex Legends and its possible effects, we spoke with Anglican Schools Commission Cyber Safety and Digital Wellbeing Advocate Steve Window, who has played the game and believes many parents may be unaware their children are already playing it. With his help, we have put together a list of points that parents need to know – from Apex Legends' addictive properties to strategies for dealing with the game should it cause concerns in your family.
