REALMS OF THINKING

During the holidays, I bumped into a past staff member who retired a few years ago. He wanted to congratulate the School for being listed amongst the Top 100 most innovative learning organisations in the world, by Cambridge University, but he wasn't sure what it was exactly that caused them to approach us to seek permission to put us on the list.

Following that encounter, I attended an international conference held in Singapore about the future of education globally. At that conference, I met staff from a school in Melbourne who had heard a lot about the work of St Paul's School and they are keen to visit our School.

Some of you may have had similar thoughts: an awareness that St Paul's has achieved global recognition and accolades, but unsure of the specifics regarding *why* we have been so recognised.

Essentially, St Paul's School has been recognised because of our ground-breaking work on creativity, innovation and entrepreneurialism. Some context though, might be helpful here.

Speakers at the conference in Singapore all recognised that the world has changed, and is continuing to change, at a rapid pace. The jobs of the future will be vastly different to what they are now. What young people need, apart from being of good character, is the ability to think creatively.

Sir Ken Robinson's Ted Talk video, "Do Schools Kill Creativity?" (viewed over 17 million times on Youtube: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=iG9CE55wbtY) tells the story of how schools effectivity kill students' passions and ability to be creative. St Paul's didn't want to be one of those typical schools.

While many schools across the globe recognise the challenges education faces, not many have kept pace with the innovations undertaken at St Paul's.

This is because, over the past eight years, we have researched and created a way of teaching that nurtures and grows every child's creativity in every curriculum area. We call this teaching method: "Realms of Thinking".

Realms of Thinking is growing in global awareness. In fact, it was because of the Realms of Thinking that last year we won "Best Innovation in School Curriculum" at the Australian national education awards in Sydney, alongside our recognition by Cambridge University.

Schools and universities have been coming to visit St Paul's School from all parts of the country to learn about our approach to creative thinking.

Coupled with our work on the Realms of Thinking, Cambridge University was also very impressed with our development of a third pathway for learning: an entrepreneurial pathway.

Many schools are now recognising the importance of entrepreneurialism and are boasting that they have "Shark Tank" experiences for their students, but no School has a dedicated Centre for Innovators and Entrepreneurs (CIE).

Students who have been encouraged to think creatively can scale their ideas to become a genuine business through the CIE. Why is it that people become entrepreneurs in spite of their education? Why can't they become an entrepreneur because of their education?

The Realms of Thinking and the entrepreneurial pathway are what makes St Paul's School one of the most innovative learning organisations in the world.

FAITH, FAMILY & FULFILMENT

It's good to be back at school, although the holidays were great too. I trust that all students are refreshed and looking forward to all that Term 2 will bring. I trust too that each St Paul's family was able to spend some meaningful time together – especially over the Easter long-weekend.

Had you realised that our word "holidays" is derived from "holy days" in Old English? In addition to the Judeo-Christian pattern of one day of rest (Sabbath) in every seven, God has also ordained that feasts and holy days should be set aside, to remember His provision for us. Christmas (the birth of Christ) and Easter (the death and resurrection of Christ) are pre-

eminent among these holy days within Christian societies.

Periodic rest and recreation are important aspects of a balanced life (as are, I would argue, worship and fellowship with other believers). We probably all have preferred forms of recreation: mine include sleeping in, leisurely cups of coffee, walking on the beach and reading. I am pleased to say that I accomplished all of these over the last two weeks.

I would like to reflect on one thing I read this last weekend, in the Weekend Australian. Social demographer, Simon Kuestenmacher, wrote an interesting article titled "Losing faith in religion leaves young trapped in painful search for meaning". He cites census data which shows that the proportion of the population identifying as Christian has fallen from 97% to 58% over the past fifty years. Over the same time, the proportion identifying as having "No religion" has increased from 1% to 33%. Clearly, there are a lot of factors at play here, but the change is very significant.

Kuestenmacher also points out that, over the past ten years, the number of under-18s prescribed anti-depressant medication has increased from around 25,000 to 100,000. Again, I don't want to over-simplify this situation, nor to confuse correlation with causation. However, in this fast-paced world, mental health problems do seem to be reaching epidemic proportions.

Kuestenmacher suggests that the two trends may be related. He suggests that, as religion has fallen out of favour, more and more people are seeking to find meaning in their lives at work. This is

fine, so long as you have the luxury of having a fulfilling job; a job that provides both income and purpose.

Throughout this term, RaVE teachers will be talking to their Year 10 classes about post-school education and employment options, as students begin to develop their SET plans. Of course, these conversations are on-going with students in Years 11 and 12. We do encourage students to aim for further studies and employment in areas that they are passionate about. As I often say, life is too short to be stuck in a job you don't enjoy. However, I certainly wouldn't suggest to students that our work should be the only source of fulfilment in our lives. Our faith, our relationships with family and friends, and our service of others in community are much more reliable sources of meaning and fulfilment.

2. GROWTH MINDSET/MOTIVATIONAL POSTER INITIATIVE

When families, teachers, and mentors use motivational quotes for kids that focus on healthy peer and adult relationships, they stimulate children to think differently about their social interactions.

Sociability is the joyful, cooperative ability to engage with others. It is derived from a collection of social-emotional skills that help youth understand and express feelings and behaviours in ways that facilitate positive relationships. These behaviours include active listening, self-regulation, and effective communication.

Parents and teachers improve young people's sociability when they help youth understand that the words they choose make a difference to the relationships they create. When adults help youth see that every social interaction is tied to an emotional reaction, young people learn to avoid impulsive behaviour and think through difficult situations before acting.

Motivational quotes for kids that focus on relational experiences can provide a guide for children as they interact with others.

Last term, we completed the poster initiative and the results are amazing.
